



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UUCF/Andrew Scott Johnson Memorial Scholarship Foundation Schedules Tenth Annual Bass Fishing Tournament

The UUCF/Andrew Scott Johnson Memorial Scholarship Foundation will be holding its two—day Bass Fishing Tournament on Friday, March 5 – Saturday, March 6, 2010 on the Kissimmee Chain of Lakes on Lake Toho at the Big Toho Marina. This tournament has been organized to raise funds for the UUCF/Andrew Scott Johnson Memorial Scholarship Foundation. The Fishing Tournament Chairman Scott Johnson has already started making plans for this event.


The schedule for both days is as follows: Check in/Registration starting at 6:30 a.m.; Cast Off at 7:00 a.m. (or safe light); and Weigh-

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OSHA 300-A Form – Summary of Work–Related Injuries and Illnesses – Must be Posted

his is a reminder that all companies are required to post the Summary of Work–Related Injuries and Illnesses (Form 300–A) — by February 1 of the year following the year covered by the form and keep it posted until April 30 of that year. You must keep the Log and Summary for five years following the year to which they pertain.

Employers must keep a Log of Work-Related Injuries and Illnesses and Summary for each establishment or site. If you have more than one establishment, you must keep a separate Log and Summary for each physical location that is expected to be in operation

for one year or longer. Note: you can use a workers' compensation or insurance form, if it contains the same information.

Note that your employees have the right to review your injury and illness records.

All employers covered by the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970 (P.L. 91-596) must report to OSHA any workplace incident resulting in a fatality or the inpatient hospitalization of three or more employees within eight hours.

Employers must prepare and maintain records of work-related injuries and illnesses.

The Log of Work–Related Injuries and Illnesses (Form 300) is used to classify work–related injuries and illnesses and to note the extent and severity of each case as well as track days away from work, restricted or transferred. When an incident occurs, use the Log to record specific details about what happened and how it happened.

The Injury and Illness Incident Report (Form 301) is one of the first forms you must fill out when a recordable work-related injury or illness has occurred. Together with the Log of Work-Related Injuries and Illnesses and the accompanying Summary, these forms help the employer and OSHA develop a picture of the extent and severity of

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work-related incidents. Within seven calendar davs after vou receive information that a recordable workrelated injury or illness has occurred, you must fill out this form or an equivalent. Some state workers' compensation, insurance, or other reports may be acceptable substitutes. To be considered an equivalent form, any substitute must contain all the information asked for on this form. According to Public Law 91-596 and 29 CFR 1904, OSHA's recordkeeping rule, you must keep this form on file for five years following the year to which it pertains.

Record those work-related injuries and illnesses that result in:

- death,
- loss of consciousness,
- days away from work, restricted work activity or job transfer, or medical treatment beyond first aid.

You must also record work-related injuries and illnesses that are

significant (as defined below) or meet any of the additional criteria listed below.

You must record any significant work–related injury or illness that is diagnosed by a physician or other licensed health care professional. You must record any work-related case involving cancer, chronic irreversible disease, a fractured or cracked bone, or a punctured eardrum. See 29 CFR 1904.7.

You must record the following conditions when they are work-related:

- any needlestick injury or cut from a sharp object that is contaminated with another person's blood or other potentially infectious material;
- any case requiring an employee to be medically removed under the requirements of an OSHA health standard;
- tuberculosis infection as evidenced by a positive skin test or diagnosis by a physician or other licensed

- health care professional after exposure to a known case of active tuberculosis.
- an employee's hearing test (audiogram) reveals 1) that the employee has experienced a Standard Threshold Shift (STS) in hearing in one or both ears (averaged at 2000, 3000, and 4000 Hz) and 2) the employee's total hearing level is 25 decibels (dB) or more above audiometric zero (also averaged at 2000, 3000, and 4000 Hz) in the same ear(s) as the STS.

The Summary — a separate form (Form 300–A) — shows the totals for the year in each category. At the end of the year, post the Summary in a visible location so that your employees are aware of the injuries and illnesses occurring in their workplace.

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Battle of the Forms GLENN (Part II of II)

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ast month, we described and illustrated the differences between the "Mirror Image Rule," which governs offers and acceptances when services or goods and services are being purchased, and the Uniform Commercial Code (UCC) rules, which apply when solely goods are involved. In Part II, we will describe some of the other UCC rules which apply in a "Battle of the Forms" situation and steps buyers and sellers can take to eliminate uncertainty regarding the terms of the deal when forms are exchanged.

Recall that under the UCC, any definite and timely expression of acceptance can create a contract for the sale of goods even if the acceptance includes different or additional terms. A seller/offeror may want to prevent any different or new terms from being injected into the deal and the UCC has rules that allow an offeror to restrict the deal to the terms of the offer. For example, if the initial offer expressly states that any acceptance is restricted to the terms of the offer (i.e. the offer rejects in advance any additional or different terms), then any definite and seasonable expression of acceptance creates a contract, but the different or additional terms are excluded.

Another exception is where the different or additional terms materially alter the deal, in which case, the new terms are not part of the contract. A material alteration is generally found if the additional or different terms create surprise or

hardship on the other party. Examples of clauses that are generally viewed as being material alterations that are not automatically included in a contract would include: a disclaimer of standard warranties of merchantability or fitness, or a clause making the seller responsible for all sales taxes when previous sales did not include such a provision.

Here is an illustration of the UCC offer and acceptance rules in action. Our same Prime Contractor, Inc. from last month needs to purchase steel guardrail and hardware which the prime contractor will install using his own forces. Since the prime contractor is merely buying the goods and not labor to install, the UCC applies. Guardrail Supplier. Inc. offers to sell Prime Contractor, Inc. the steel guardrail for \$75 and the offer to sell is silent regarding whether hardware is included or not. Prime Contractor, Inc. sends the supplier a purchase order form that accepts the offer but adds that Guardrail Supplier, Inc. is also to provide hardware and expensive traffic attenuators for the same \$75. Under these facts, the prime contractor's purchase order is a legitimate acceptance and a contract has been formed for the supply of the guardrail. Prime Contractor, Inc.'s additional terms for the supply of the hardware and for the supply of the traffic attenuators would also be part of the deal unless the additions materially alter the deal or the supplier objects. In all likelihood, requiring the supplier to also provide the expensive traffic attenuators

would be deemed a material alteration and that additional term would not be a part of the contract. The hardware may be a closer question depending on whether the supply of the hardware would be deemed a hardship on the supplier or constituted a surprise to the supplier.

The supplier could protect itself from having to potentially supply the additional goods added by the prime contractor's acceptance by including language in Guardrail Supplier, Inc.'s offer stating that the offer is restricted to the terms of the offer and any acceptance is restricted to the terms of that offer. In that manner, any additional or different terms are rejected in advance by the seller. Alternatively, upon receipt of the prime contractor's additional terms, the seller could send the prime contractor a timely rejection of prime contractor's additional proposed terms. A timely objection to the proposed additional terms would prevent the contract from including the additional items.

What happens if the supplier's offer rejects all additional or different terms in advance, but the prime contractor's acceptance includes additional terms and also states that the prime contractor's acceptance is conditioned upon seller's assent to the prime contractor's additional terms? In other words, both parties exchange forms that restrict any deal to the terms on their own particular form. In that case, the UCC states that the writings do not form the





contract. However, if the parties go ahead and perform, then they have an oral contract and any of the written terms that are in agreement in the exchanged forms would be part of the oral contract. This often happens when: (1) a supplier submits a proposal which states that all different or additional terms are rejected; (2) the buyer sends the seller a purchase order accepting the offer, but the purchase order also states that the acceptance is expressly conditioned upon the seller's assent to the buyer's purchase order terms; (3) both parties perform as if they have a deal (i.e., the seller supplies the goods, the buyer accepts the goods); and then (4) there is a dispute. In that situation, the UCC deems that there is an oral contract rather than a written contract created by the seller's written offer and the buyer's written acceptance. Usually at that point, the lawyers are called in to help the judge decide what terms are included in the oral contract.

The lesson to be learned is that the rules regarding what creates a contract and what is included in the contract are often determined by whether the contract involves services (and/or goods and services), in which case the Mirror Image Rule applies, or just the supply of goods, in which case UCC rules apply.

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

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OSHA Welcomes GAO's Report on Under-Reporting of Workplace Injuries and Illnesses

OSHA Finds Problems Identified in Report Alarming

he U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) welcomes the Government Accountability Office's (GAO) report on the under-reporting of workplace injuries and illnesses and OSHA's audit process.

The report identifies a number of factors that may contribute to the inaccuracy of employer injury and illness records, as well as problems with the audits that OSHA conducts to ensure their accuracy.

"Accurate injury and illness records

are vital to protect workers' health and safety," said Secretary of Labor Hilda L. Solis. "They not only enable OSHA to better target its resources and determine the effectiveness of its efforts, accurate numbers are also an important tool that workers and employers can use to identify hazards in their workplaces."

The report identifies worker intimidation as well as a number of disincentives that may discourage workers and employers from reporting work-related injuries and illnesses. The report also notes widespread reports from

occupational health practitioners who were pressured not to record an injury or illness.

Acting Assistant Secretary for OSHA Jordan Barab announced that the agency will move swiftly to implement the recommendations made by the GAO. Additionally, in response to numerous studies of under-reporting and congressional interest, on October 1, OSHA implemented a National Emphasis Program on Recordkeeping. OSHA will send inspectors into worksites



Certified Contractor License Renewal Reminder

Just a reminder that the Certified Contractor licenses from the Department of Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR) are up for renewal on August 31, 2010. Current law requires licenseholders to obtain 14 hours of continuing education with at least one hour in workplace safety, one hour in workers' compensation, one hour in business practices, one hour in the advance building code module, one hour in laws and rules (Chapter 489) and one hour in wind mitigation (this requirement only affects general, residential, building, roofing and glass and glazing contractors).

Don't forget to notify the DBPR office of any address change. Section 489.124(2) gives sole responsibility to the licensee for notifying DBPR in writing of the licensee's current mailing address and phone number. Failure to notify the department of a change of address shall constitute a violation of this section. In addition, if your address changes and you do not notify the department, you may not receive important mailings from the department such as your renewal notice.

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New Reporting Requirement for Criminal Convictions

During the 2009 Legislative Session, the Florida Legislature passed House Bill 425, which became law on October 1, 2009. Beginning October 1, 2009, House Bill 425 requires all professional licensees to report to the department within 30 days of being convicted or found guilty of, or having plead nolo contendere or guilty to a crime in any jurisdiction. House Bill 425 also requires that any conviction prior to October 1, 2009 be reported by November 1, 2009. A licensee who fails to report that information may be subject to disciplinary action, including fines, suspension or license revocation. To report this information, complete the criminal self-reporting document and mail to the department as provided on the form located at http://



Division of Regulation

The Division of Regulation is the enforcement authority for the professional boards and programs. It monitors those professions and related businesses to ensure that the laws, rules and standards set by the Legislature and professional boards are followed. This is accomplished by proactively monitoring the professionals and related businesses; investigating complaints of wrongdoing; utilizing compliance mechanisms such as notices of noncompliance and citations; and the performance of

statutorily mandated inspections.

The division is divided into six program areas and operates eight regional offices. The six program areas are: Complaints: Alternative Dispute Resolution: Unlicensed Activity; Compliance; Farm Labor; and Child Labor. Regional offices, headed by Regional Program Administrators, are located in Tallahassee, Jacksonville, Gainesville, Orlando, Ft. Myers, West Palm Beach, Margate (Ft. Lauderdale), Miami and satellite offices in Pensacola and Tampa.

Letter from Outgoing DBPR Secretary

November 20, 2009

Contractor V License Renewals

Just a reminder that the Contractor V license from the State Fire Marshal's office is up for renewal on June $30,\ 2010.$ Current law requires Contractor V licenseholders to obtain 14 hours of continuing education with at least one hour in fire protection discipline.

Reciprocity was established between the State Fire Marshal's office and the Construction Industry Licensing Board (CILB). Any hours obtained through CILB approved courses can apply towards your Contractor V license. The same applies to courses obtained through the State Fire Marshal's office.

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
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




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
