

SSOCOF Update

Committee Hammers Out Legislative Revisions, Seeking Consensus Within Industry

Sunshine State One Call of Florida, Inc.'s (SSOCOF) Legislative Ad Hoc Committee continues its work to revise the Underground Facility Damage Prevention and Safety Act, Chapter 556, F.S. As always, the committee seeks consensus among all stakeholders. The Underground Utility Contractors of Florida (UUCF) is represented on the committee by Mike Woodall, John Woody, Inc. of Jacksonville and UUCF Vice President, who is the excavator representative on the SSOCOF Board, along with R. Bruce Kershner, UUCF Executive Vice President.

Several areas within the law have stirred controversy among industry constituents. "We will continue to work with our members," states Dave Erwin, SSOCOF Legal Counsel and principal legislative writer, "to negotiate through the issues and seek consensus."

Some of the items still being negotiated include prohibiting local governing bodies from adopting ordinances that contradict Chapter 556, F.S., defining high priority facilities, requiring mandatory damage reporting, using the Division of Administrative Hearings in cases of catastrophic damage and specifying low impact marking instructions.

The Board of Directors authorized Mike Moore, SSOCOF Lobbyist, to seek sponsors for the proposed amendments that will be sought during the 2010 Legislative session.

Though there are numerous proposed changes to the "one call law" in the upcoming Legislative Session, 85% or better have nothing to do with underground utility contractors. Some of those changes entail cleaning up old language, getting rid of a few items that have never been used and getting language making utility owners and contractors report damages to the one call system. The last issue might


not make it because there is opposition from the large utilities.

There will probably be an increase in fines. Unfortunately, the federal Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA) is becoming more involved with all "one call" systems around the country. PHMSA has nine elements or rules that one call systems must meet. SSOCOF currently meets the majority of them; however, the fines and penalties elements are not one of them. After much debate, the SSOCOF Board agreed to try and comply with PHMSA and proposed fines ranging from \$500 to \$5,000. Though the fines might sound excessive, they are cheap compared to other one call systems around the country. In other states like Virginia, the same penalties range from \$1,500 to \$25,000.

The life of a locate ticket will probably be changed back to 20 days from the current 30 days. This is to help with the urban graffiti

problem which has led to many communities adopting local ordinances to control marks and their removal. White lining will probably become a part of the changes in the law. Though many may view this as being onerous to the excavator, the alternative of placing the responsibility of the removal of all marks on the excavator is unacceptable. In an abundance of caution, locators tend to over mark based on the description in the ticket. Under the current proposal, excavators will only be responsible for marks inside the white lined construction area.

UUCF has worked with SSOCOF to include in the proposed changes the creation of an alternative dispute resolution process. The proposed arbitration suggestion came to UUCF from some of its members. It is also one of PHMSA's nine elements. The program would be available to excavators and member operators regarding disputes arising from excavation activities including loss of service, down time, delays or loss of





use of facilities.

UUCF will continue to monitor and update members on the progress of this proposed legislation.

Emergency Procedures Vary, Chapter 556 Has Clear Instructions

Handling emergency situations varies among utility companies and their locators, but the Underground Facility Damage Prevention and Safety Act, Chapter 556, F.S., is clear. The following are some tips to help guide you through an emergency whether you're an excavator or member operator.

By definition, an emergency situation is when a damage occurs to an underground facility that results in clear and present danger to life or property. This can happen when the underground facility damage causes a substance to leak, there is an interruption in vital public or communication services or when street or road traffic becomes dangerous (i.e., no traffic light at a busy intersection). Forgetting to request a locate ticket two days ago does not constitute an emergency.

When an excavator damages an underground facility, he must notify the facility owner of the damage. Contact information can be found on the locate ticket. ITE users have an online copy of the ticket and others can receive it by e-mail or by calling 811. An emergency ticket does not need to be requested.

The utility that needs to make the repairs should request the emergency

ticket. Excavators must stop any digging that will further damage the facility until the owner has taken appropriate actions to repair the damaged facility. It is extremely important to note that a simple nick should not be covered up. Even the tiniest hole in an outer covering can cause a future outage.

After being notified of a damage, members have some options for responding. If the damage is severe, causing immediate danger to the surrounding area, they can begin repairs immediately and request an emergency ticket after the repair is made. In this case, the ticket serves to notify other members with underground facilities in the area that a repair involving digging occurred.

In some cases, repair will be delayed when there are no crews available or there is another more critical emergency. In such a case, a member could request an emergency ticket which specifies when a work crew will be at the site.

Some companies require locates to be done within a short amount of time after receiving an emergency ticket; however, there is no mandate in Chapter 556, F.S., to provide these locates other than within two full business days.

New Markers Showing Up At Florida Dig Sites

Orange and white striped flags began showing up at excavation sites a few months ago causing several to wonder what they were since locate flags are solid. The striped flags are actually being used by AT&T to mark high profile lines. The flags instruct excavators to call a number before digging so AT&T can be present during excavation and provide additional protection to the high profile lines. As of this newsletter's publishing, AT&T is the only telecommunications company using the striped flags.

Founding Member Retires, Leaves Legacy of Innovation

After 16 years serving in the damage prevention industry as a Sunshine State One Call director, Jeff Rodger, formerly of TECO Peoples Gas, retired, leaving behind a legacy of innovation and a passion for safety within the industry.

Rodger was one of SSOCOF's founding members. He participated in the call center's ground-breaking ceremony, attended numerous national meetings and was always seeking innovative technologies and new ways to solve problems facing the organization.

Throughout the years, Rodger has served as chairman of the board in addition to chairman of several committees including Legislative, Operations and Bylaws.

He was also instrumental in SSOCOF's decision to convert to the Irth Solutions ticket management system and in looking forward to the requirements enacted by the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration.

SSOCOF will miss his dedication and pioneering spirit.

Certified Contractor License Renewal Reminder

Just a reminder that the Certified Contractor licenses from the Department of Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR) are up for renewal on August 31, 2010. Current law requires licenseholders to obtain 14 hours of continuing education with at least one hour in workplace safety, one hour in workers' compensation, one hour in business practices, one hour in the advance building code module, one hour in laws and rules (Chapter 489) and one hour in wind mitigation (this requirement only affects general, residential, building, roofing and glass and glazing contractors).

Don't forget to notify the DBPR office of any address change. Section 489.124(2) gives sole responsibility to the licensee for notifying DBPR in writing of the licensee's current mailing address and phone number. Failure to notify the department of a change of address shall constitute a violation of this section. In addition, if your address changes and you do not notify the department, you may not receive important mailings from the department such as your renewal notice.

St. Pete Beach Abandons Local Experiment in Amendment 4

ince beginning a three-year experiment in Amendment four-style rule, St. Pete Beach residents have seen endless lawsuits. higher taxes and widespread economic turmoil. In recent elections, the citizens of St. Pete Beach voted to scale back their local version of Amendment 4 so that only certain land use changes require a referendum. With Florida voters set to soon decide the fate of Amendment 4 - a statewide Vote on Everything initiative - it is telling that St. Pete Beach voters chose to rein in their own local experiment by a decisive 60-40 margin.

More telling still are the words of Ward Friszolowski, former St. Pete Beach Mayor who retired in 2008.

"St. Pete Beach residents are tired of voting on everything, especially issues that don't even relate to development," said Friszolowski. "This amendment doesn't work. It has resulted in chaotic, confusing and expensive elections driven by sound bites rather than sound planning."

No other state in the union has adopted an amendment as heavyhanded and extreme as the one now being sold to Florida voters as Amendment 4. Even the type of planning by sound bite that takes place in California would pale in comparison to what is being proposed in our state. However, we can draw lessons from the story of St. Pete Beach, the first community in Florida to adopt a local version of

Amendment 4.

The St. Pete Beach TIMELINE:

November, 2006: St. Pete Beach narrowly adopts a local version of Amendment 4, requiring a referendum for all changes to the local comprehensive plan. Amendment 4 supporters promise that they just want to give "the people a right to vote."

June, 2008: St. Pete Beach voters approve a new comprehensive plan at the ballot box.


June, 2008: After losing the election, Amendment 4 supporters in



Battle of the Forms GLENN (Part I of II)

ow many times has this happened to you? A supplier sends you a written proposal to supply materials. Your purchasing department sends the supplier a written purchase order. Neither document is signed by the receiving party. When there is a problem, no one is really sure what documents make up the contract or what terms are part of the contract. That situation is commonly referred to as a "Battle of the Forms," and problems like that are what help to keep lawyers' kids in private schools. This article may help you avoid a Battle of the Forms, or at least help you figure out what your rights and obligations are next time forms are exchanged.

At its most basic level, in order to have a contract there must be an offer and an acceptance of the offer. That seems like a simple rule, but on any given construction project there can be two sets of rules regarding what is a legitimate offer and what is a qualifying acceptance. One set of rules applies if the proposed contract is for the sale of "goods and services" (such as a subcontract to supply and install pipe), and a different set of rules applies if the proposed contract is for "goods" (for example a contract to supply pipe). It is important to know which set of rules applies, because the rules determine whether you have an enforceable contract and what terms can be enforced. In a Battle of the Forms the form that wins the battle can determine which party wins a

dispute. So, maybe this article will help you win (or better, avoid) your next Battle of the Forms.

The "Mirror Image Rule" applies to contracts for goods and services and contracts for just services. That means the acceptance has to be a mirror image of the offer. If the acceptance proposes terms different or in addition to the terms in the initial offer, then the "acceptance" is deemed a rejection and a counteroffer and there is no deal. A counteroffer does not create a contract until it, in turn, is accepted by a qualifying acceptance that is the mirror image of the counteroffer. An example may help illustrate this point. Assume that Prime Contractor, Inc. has a roadway improvement project and Subcontractor, Inc. offers to supply and install 1,000 feet of galvanized steel guardrail for \$100. Obviously \$100 per 1,000 feet is a joke, but given the number of bidders at lettings today and depressed prices, it isn't a funny joke. Subcontractor, Inc.'s written offer excludes all mounting hardware. Prime Contractor, Inc. sends Subcontractor, Inc. a letter stating that Prime Contractor, Inc. accepts the subcontractor's offer, but states that Subcontractor, Inc. must also provide all mounting hardware and traffic attenuators. At that point, Prime Contractor, Inc.'s "acceptance" is really a counteroffer because the acceptance of the offer to provide labor and material was not a mirror image of the subcontractor's offer. Unless and until the

counteroffer is accepted by the subcontractor, there is no contract. If Prime Contractor, Inc. had merely said "deal" with no revisions to the offer, then the acceptance would have been valid and both the prime contractor and subcontractor would have enforceable contract rights.

In contrast, if instead of labor and materials, the offer solely involves the sale of "goods" between "merchants," then the Mirror Image Rule does not apply. In that situation, the Uniform Commercial Code (UCC) applies. Under the UCC, a "merchant" is someone who regularly buys and sells "goods." The UCC defines "goods" generally as all moveable things other than money. Therefore, when the deal involves the supply (but not installation) of materials or equipment on a construction project, most prime contractors and suppliers qualify as "merchants" dealing in "goods" and the UCC rules apply.

The UCC was developed to promote commerce, and one way it accomplishes that goal is by doing away with the Mirror Image Rule. When an acceptance does not have to be the mirror image of the offer, it is easier for an enforceable contract to be formed. Under the UCC, when an offer has been made to buy or sell goods, any "definite and seasonable expression of acceptance or a written confirmation which is sent within a reasonable time" operates

as an acceptance even though it states terms that are additional to or different from those contained in the offer. A contract is formed under the UCC when there is a definite and seasonable expression of acceptance and any additional or different terms contained in the acceptance are deemed to be proposals to be added to the contract. Unless the new terms materially alter the deal or they are objected to, they become part of the deal. Thus, even an acceptance that does not mirror the offer can result in a binding contract under the UCC when the deal is between merchants and involves the sale of goods (not services or goods and services).

Of course, there are exceptions to the UCC acceptance rule. Without exceptions to the rules, there would be no need for lawyers, and then I would have to get a real job. Next

month in Part II, we will discuss the exceptions to the UCC acceptance rules and describe methods sellers and buyers can use to eliminate the uncertainty regarding the terms of their deal.

OSHA's New Letter of Interpretation Requires that Construction Workers Wear High-Visibility Warning Garments

H igh-visibility warning garments are required safety attire for highway and road construction workers according to a new *letter of interpretation* recently released by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

"Highway construction workers should not suffer serious or fatal injuries simply because they could not be seen," said acting Assistant Secretary of Labor for OSHA Jordan Barab. "Requiring the use of reflective vests is essential to help prevent workers from being injured or killed."

In 2004, OSHA issued a letter of interpretation about the use of high-

visibility apparel in highway construction. The letter emphasized that section 5(a)(1) of the OSH Act requires workers in highway work zones to wear high-visibility apparel.

However, the Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission ruled that OSHA's letter indicated a more limited position: high-visibility garments are only required where the Federal Highway Administration's Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) mandates their use.

Therefore, OSHA is issuing a new letter stating that all highway and road construction workers must wear high-visibility apparel regardless of

whether the MUTCD requires them. OSHA considers road and construction traffic a well–recognized hazard to highway/road construction workers. Bureau of Labor Statistics reinforced the need for using safety apparel when data from 2003 to 2007 showed there were 425 road construction work zone fatalities.

Under the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, OSHA's role is to assure safe and healthful working conditions for America's working men and women by setting and enforcing standards; and providing training, outreach and education. For more information, visit www.osha.gov.







Contractor V License Renewals

Just a reminder that the Contractor V license from the State Fire Marshal's office is up for renewal on June 30, 2010. Current law requires Contractor V licenseholders to obtain 14 hours of continuing education with at least one hour in fire protection discipline.

Reciprocity was established between the State Fire Marshal's office and the Construction Industry Licensing Board (CILB). Any hours obtained through CILB approved courses can apply towards your Contractor V license. The same applies to courses obtained through the State Fire Marshal's office.


