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UUCF Schedules Three-Day President's Cup Golf Tournament at PGA National in Palm Beach Gardens

Come and enjoy three wonderful days and two nights at the PGA National in Palm Beach Gardens, Florida on October 1-3. You will enjoy three fun-filled days of golfing on three different 18 hole courses. Participants will have the opportunity to play on the Palmer Course on Friday, Champion course on Saturday and Squire course on Sunday. A different tournament will be held on each course. The format will be a two-man scramble, two-man best ball and two-man alternate shot. All tournaments will be handicapped so everyone will have an equal opportunity to win.

Mike Woodall with John Woody, Inc. is chairing this year's tournament. A portion of the proceeds from this year's tournament will benefit the UUCF Legal Defense Fund.

Palmer Course – Named after its designer, Arnold Palmer, this course is one of the more forgiving at PGA National from tee to fairway and known as a risk reward course. The open fairways and larger "Champion Bermuda" greens can be quite accommodating and invite players to take a chance if they dare as golfers are not overly penalized for missing the fairway or primary rough on most holes. There is a considerable amount of undulation through the fairway presenting the opportunity for uneven lies and creative shot making. The Palmer has a great series of finishing holes, with the 18th being one of the most scenic and picturesque par 5's on the property.

Champion Course – Originally designed by Tom and George Fazio for major tournament play, The Champion course at PGA National



Resort & Spa was redesigned by Jack Nicklaus in 1990 and now hosts the Honda Classic each March on the PGA TOUR. Although The Champion has generous landing areas and spacious and accepting tif-eagle greens, golfers are presented with course management challenges throughout the round. This South Florida golf resort course has five sets of tees to make the course more playable for golfers of

all levels. A "must play" stop on any avid golfer's list, The Champion features "The Bear Trap," which spans three demanding holes designed by Jack Nicklaus. Considered one of Florida's most notable golf challenges, USA Today calls The Bear Trap "one of the toughest stretches in golf."

Squire Course – Named after the immortal Gene Sarazen, the first golfer ever to win the professional Grand Slam, "the thinking man's course" is the ultimate test of accuracy and precision. Designed by Tom and George Fazio, the Squire is the shortest and the most exacting of the courses at PGA National Resort & Spa. Accuracy with fairway woods

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and long irons is tested on many tees and the new smaller "Emerald Bermuda" greens demand precise approach shots. Several doglegs provide a risk reward opportunity for any longer hitter as well. The Squire is surrounded by natural environmental areas and teeming with native vegetation, which attracts an abundance of wildlife. The 5th hole even runs along part of the wilderness preserve, which borders the west side of the PGA National community.

The entry fee for the three-day tournament is only \$565.00 per player. The entry fee includes three rounds of golf for the tournament, two nights' accommodation, breakfast on Saturday and Sunday, \$30.00 dinner voucher for Friday and Saturday, one free mulligan for each day (option to purchase additional mulligans will be available), skins game on Friday and Saturday and beverages on the course during tournament play. A Hospitality Suite will be available for your enjoyment.

UUCF is also selling the Survival Kit. Included in the package are: **Friday:** three mulligans, putting contest and ball in the circle contest; **Saturday:** three mulligans, two throws, putting contest, ball in the circle contest and Hole in One Contest; and **Sunday:** three mulligans, two throws, putting contest and ball in the circle contest. If the above items were purchased

separately, it would cost \$185.00. However, for golfers who purchase the Survival Kit prior to the first day of the tournament, the cost is only \$175.00. Golfers may also participate in the optional skins game on Sunday at a cost of \$50.00 per team.

There will be great prizes (first and second place each day), optional purchase of the skins game on Sunday and a lot of fun. There will also be prizes for Longest Drive and Closest to the Pin. We will also be holding a putting contest each day.

The tournament is open to the first 60 teams. Hurry and mail your entry fee along with the registration form as soon as possible. Sleeping accommodations consist of two people per one bedroom (two double beds).


The UUCF PAC had a successful Primary Election cycle, supporting 36 candidates. A number of members of the Florida Legislature

The top priority for UUCF during the 2011 Legislative Session will be Competitive Bid. Over the past six months, reports have been coming into the UUCF office that local governments are trying to self perform water and sewer projects. Florida Statute 255.20 requires local governments to competitively bid projects that are estimated to be in excess of \$300,000. UUCF will be proposing amendments to the

existing Competitive Bid Statute in order to close up loopholes and put some teeth in the law.

UUCF will also be working on or monitoring other construction and business legislative issues that could include:

- revising the statutory formula for the Workers' Compensation Special Disability Trust Fund.

- DBPR will probably introduce a legislative package that could address pre-licensure education and contractor licensing bonds.
- proposed changes to the Florida Construction Lien Law.
- anti-geographic bid preference.
- crane ordinances.
- immigration tied to e-verify
- revisions to the Notice of Nonpayment statute.



Executive Order 13496 and What It Means For Federal Contractors and Subcontractors

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If your company works on federal projects as a prime contractor or subcontractor, you now have a new labor law poster that must be posted where your employees can see it and you also have several other new requirements to satisfy or your company could be fined or even debarred from working on federal projects. All of this is a result of Obama's Executive Order 13496 which was issued in 2009 as a

"thank you" for Organized Labor's support of Obama. Executive Order 13496 required the Department of Labor to issue new rules implementing the Order, and those rules went into effect on June 21, 2010.

Executive Order 13496 changed the requirements that federal contractors and subcontractors have regarding notification of employee rights under the National Labor Relations Act

(NLRA). Under the new Order and rules, federal contractors and subcontractors must post an "Employee Rights Notice," which informs employees about their right to form, join, assist or support unions and bargain collectively with their employer; lists several examples of conduct by employers and unions that violates employees' rights; and tells employees how to contact the

NLRB to ask questions or file charges. The regulations that went into effect June 21, 2010 implementing Obama's Order also require federal contractors to include in every contract, subcontract and purchase order, a pledge to honor the employee notice requirements. The "Employee Rights Notice" consists of a mandatory poster that all federal contractors and subcontractors are required to post without modification.

Under the prior Executive Order issued by President Bush federal contractors were merely required to post a notice (commonly known as a "Beck" notice) to their employees informing them that they were not required to join or maintain membership in a labor union, and

that those who were not union members, but were still required to pay union dues, could object to paying a portion of those dues or fees to support activities that are not related to collective bargaining, contract administration or grievance adjustment. So, instead of informing employees of their right not to be part of Organized Labor, now employers must inform employees that they have the right to be part of Organized Labor and employers must "pledge" to require all sub-tier contractors to also provide such a notice via contracts and subcontracts.

Obama's Executive Order applies to all construction contractors doing business as a prime contractor or subcontractor on federal projects. Copies of the Notice are available for download at the U.S. Department of Labor's web site (<http://www.dol.gov/olms/regs/compliance/EO13496.htm>).

Employers must post the Notice exactly as issued by the DOL, meaning that it cannot be altered in size, color or content. If your work force is not proficient in English, then you are also required to provide the notice in the language(s) your employees speak.

Any employee of a covered contractor or subcontractor may file a complaint that his employer has failed to post the Notice or failed to include the required notice clause in subcontracts or purchase orders, and employers are prohibited from retaliating against any employee for filing such a complaint.

Even without an employee complaint, the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs (OFCCP) may conduct compliance reviews to determine whether a contractor or subcontractor under a covered contract is complying with Executive Order 13496 and the

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rules. As you may know, the OFCCP is responsible for ensuring that contractors doing business with the federal government do not discriminate and take affirmative action. All federal contractors and subcontractors should anticipate that any OFCCP compliance review will include an evaluation for compliance with Executive Order 13496, just as they now review compliance with affirmative action and Form I-9 rules.

Penalties for violating the Executive Order may include cancellation, suspension or termination of the contract or subcontract, or debarment of the employer from future federal contracts or subcontracts.

Compliance with Executive Order 13496 is not insurmountable, but it does impose additional burdens on U.S. employers and will require additional housekeeping if your

projects include work on federal projects.

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


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Did You Receive Your Copy of the UUCF 2010-2011 Directory?

Registered Contractor License Renewal Reminder

Just a reminder that the Registered Contractor licenses from the Department of Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR) are up for renewal on August 31, 2011. Current law requires licenseholders to obtain 14 hours of continuing education with at least one hour in workplace safety, one hour in workers' compensation, one hour in business practices, one hour in the advance building code module, one hour in laws and rules (Chapter 489) and one hour in wind mitigation (this requirement only affects general, residential, building, roofing and glass and glazing contractors).

Don't forget to notify the DBPR office of any address change. Section 489.124(2) gives sole responsibility to the licensee for notifying DBPR in writing of the licensee's current mailing address and phone number.

Failure to notify the department of a change of address shall constitute a violation of this section. In addition, if your address changes and you do not notify the department, you may not receive important mailings from the department such as your renewal notice.

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President's Message

Jay, Florida is a small agriculture town in north Santa Rosa County about 45 miles north of Pensacola. The people that live there make their living




farming or working in what is left of the oil field business. Like all

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Summary of Legislative Changes

Underground Facility Damage Prevention and Safety Act, Chapter 556, F.S. *Changes Effective October 1, 2010*

556.101 Short Title; legislative intent. –

s.556.101(3)(d) Prevents local governments from adopting or enforcing ordinances that regulate underground facility markings such as linking the permitting process to underground facility identification, requiring premarking or marking, specifying paint types or other marking devices, or requiring marks removal.

Impact

- Promotes consistency of underground facility marking throughout Florida's 67 counties.
- Eliminates any confusion over

marking requirements for utility operators and excavators that operate in numerous counties.

556.105 Procedures. –

s.556.105(11) Gives members the option of providing separate documentation in addition to locates for underwater work sites. This documentation can serve as a backup form of underwater facility identification in the event the original underwater locates are removed or no longer visible. Backup documentation allows the excavator to continue excavation after the marks are destroyed without needing the lines re-located. At this time, adequate documentation parameters

have not been defined and will be up to an individual member's discretion.


556.110 Costs assessed among member operators. –

s. 556.110 Removes the monthly payment exemption for members that receive fewer than 10 notifications in one month.

Impact

SSOCOF no longer bills on a per-notification basis and has changed to an assessment billing method based on the activity (ticket volume) in the territory of each member for the preceding year.

556.107 Violations. –

1. s. 556.107(1)(c) Raises the minimum fine from \$250 to \$500 for all citable violations of Chapter 556, F.S.

Impact

- Potential increase in citations written for violating Chapter 556, F.S. The higher penalty will help local governments recover any costs associated with enforcing the law.
- The higher amount will hopefully promote greater compliance with the law.

2. s. 556.107(1)(a)6 and s. 556.109(2) Creates a non-criminal violation for requesting emergency locate tickets for non-emergency situations. An emergency situation is defined by s.556.109, F.S. as any condition constituting a clear and present danger to life or property; a situation caused by the escape of any substance transported by means of an underground facility; any interruption of vital public service or communication caused by any break or defect in a member's underground facility; or any impairment of public roads or utilities that requires immediate repair, as determined by FDOT or another affected political subdivision.

Impact

- The only time an emergency ticket is to be requested is when there is an emergency, as defined above. Not wanting to wait two full business days for marking is not an emergency.
- During the locate ticket process, a caller is required to answer six questions to verify the emergency. If a caller cannot answer yes to one or all of the questions but still insists on an emergency ticket, the caller could be cited for falsely requesting an emergency ticket.
- Excavators that damage an

underground facility and create an emergency situation, as defined above, should cease excavation and notify the member directly. The member operator is then required to send personnel to the site to effect temporary or permanent repairs of the contact or damage. The member operator may, but is not required to obtain, an emergency ticket before repairing the damage.

- Reduce costs for members that choose to respond immediately to emergency tickets received after hours and on weekends.

3. s.556.107(1)(a) Creates a non-criminal violation for failure to follow the low impact marking practices outlined in s. 556.114(1), (2), (3) and (4).

4. s.556.107(1)(d) Eliminates the ability of enforcement personnel to require a court appearance for a non-criminal infraction violator.

556.114 Low-impact marking practices. –

s.556.114(3) and (4) Establishes low impact marking practices for excavators and member operators. The sections replace s. 556.105(5)(a), F.S. related to premarking.

- Excavator Low Impact marking guidelines
 - Locate ticket requests should cover only those portions of a job site where digging will

- occur within 30 calendar days of the date the ticket is requested.
- When renewing tickets for jobs lasting longer than 30 calendar days, identify only the areas where excavation will occur (i.e. eliminate any areas where digging is complete).
- Difficult-to-explain dig sites should be pre-marked if the excavator and member have not mutually agreed otherwise.
- Acceptable marking products for excavators to pre-mark a job site: flags, stakes,
- Member Low Impact marking guidelines
 - All locate marks must be in the color identified for each utility.
 - Acceptable marking products to identify facilities: flags, stakes, temporary, nonpermanent paint, other industry accepted low-impact marking practices.



Impact

- Low impact marking guidelines are designed to reduce the amount of locate marks at dig sites by requiring a more efficient locate ticket.
- Temporary, non-permanent marking paint will shorten the lifespan of marks.
- Excavators will need to plan ahead and determine how much excavation can be done within the 30-day ticket life.
- Simply renewing a locate ticket will not suffice any longer. Excavators who use office staff to renew tickets may need to change procedures. For instance, staff should contact the excavator to confirm whether the ticket should be renewed and clarify what portion of the ticket remains to be excavated.
- Reduced locating time.
- The 500-foot limitation for premarking a job site has been eliminated. See diagram below.



New Section 556.115 Alternative dispute resolution. –

Creates a voluntary alternative dispute resolution process (arbitration) to settle disputes relating to damage to an underground facility and the consequences of that damage. Arbitration is open to anyone involved in the incident.

SSOCOF has developed parameters for an arbitration process that involves the Department of Administrative Hearings. Procedures will be available in the near future.

New Section 556.116 High-priority subsurface installations; special procedures. –

Creates a new process for responding to serious incidents involving underground transmission or distribution pipelines used to transport any refined petroleum product or hazardous/highly volatile liquid such as anhydrous ammonia or carbon dioxide, if the facility is deemed to be critical by the member operators of the pipeline and is identified as a high priority subsurface installation.

SSOCOF has developed a set of procedures and reporting process for incidents involving high-priority subsurface installations. Procedures will be available in the near future.

New Cranes and Derricks Rule Published in *Federal Register*

OSHA's **new rule** addressing the use of cranes and derricks in construction was published in the **Federal Register** on August 9, 2010. Consider Using New SSOCOF Alternative Dispute Resolution

S S O C O F has created an alternative dispute resolution process for disputes over excavations that cause loss of service, down time, delays, similar economic disruptions, and non-use of facilities during restoration or replacement. This is a voluntary process and is open to anyone involved in the incident. Each party pays for DOAH services. The alternative dispute resolution process can be stopped anytime before the final decision. Parties can then pursue a formal court proceeding.

The Alternative Dispute Resolution

1. Parties agree to handle the dispute through the DOAH and accept the DOAH law judge's

2. Parties sign and send an Alternative Dispute Resolution Expense Reimbursement Contract and \$500 deposit to SSOCOF. Copies will be posted online October 1.
3. SSOCOF sends contract to DOAH.
4. An administrative law judge (ALJ) is assigned to the case.
5. The ALJ's office works with parties to schedule proceedings.
