



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Bid Protests: Grounds For and Defenses Against

ost public contracts in Florida must be awarded under a competitive bid process. Most frequently, this means the contract is awarded after a sealed bid letting where the bids are evaluated based on low price. The winner of the competition is the bidder that submitted the lowest price. Low price need not be the criteria upon which the competition is decided, but it is the most common criteria used. There also are exceptions to the requirement that public contracts be awarded via a competitive process, but discussion of the exceptions will need to be addressed in a later article. Recently we discussed the time limits within which a bid protest must be filed. This month we will identify some of the grounds that can give rise to a bid protest.

If the advertisement for bids states that the contract will be awarded to the bidder submitting the lowest responsive bid, then the more common protests we see are because: only one bid was submitted, or only one bidder could qualify; the apparent low bid was not responsive; the specifications were ambiguous; the owner awarded the contract based on something other than the criteria published in the bid advertisement; or, the owner allowed the apparent low bidder to change its bid after the fact.

Florida's competitive bid law is intended to make sure that public monies are used to obtain the best value for the public. The competitive bid laws are also intended to prevent even the appearance of favoritism and collusion in the bid process. If there is no competition to obtain a public works contract, then the public owner is not going to get the best price possible for that contract. Similarly, if there is a "competition," but it is not conducted in an open and fair manner, then contract prices ultimately will increase because eventually no one will waste their time preparing a bid if it is known that the bidder will not be treated fairly. When the specifications are clear and price is the determining factor, subjectivity, which can lead to collusion and favoritism, is removed from the competition. Thus, when a contractor believes that another bidder has received some special treatment, or has obtained an unfair advantage over the other bidders. that can lead to a bid protest.

Only One Bid was Submitted or Only One Bidder Could Qualify

Competition, by definition, requires that at least two bids to have been submitted, even if one of the bids is nonresponsive. Thus, if the bid specifications are written in such a manner that only one bidder is willing to do the work and only one bid is submitted, then the project should be revised and re-advertised. According to the court in Satellite Television Engineering, Inc. v. Department of Gen. Services, 522 So.2d 440 (Fla. 1st DCA 1988) if there have been two or more bids for a public contract, only one of which conforms in all material respects to invitation to bid, the competitive bidding requirement has

been met, and the owner may award a contract without instituting second round of bidding. The court concluded that the term "competitive bids," was intended to encompass those situations where a public owner has received one responsive bid together with one or more nonresponsive bids. On occasion, the specifications are drafted in such a manner that in reality only one bidder can submit a responsive bid. For example, owners sometimes specify that only one brand of equipment and no "or equals" will be allowed, or that only bidders with a high minimum experience threshold will be allowed to submit bids and there is no reasonable basis for such a high minimum threshold. In that instance, a pre-bid protest would be appropriate because bid advertisements that unreasonably restrict competition are contrary to the Florida competitive bid laws. Sole-source bids, whether they limit the bidders, or the material or equipment used on the project, restrict competition. Florida Statutes, Section 255.04, does allow solesource bids under certain limited circumstances, but generally when a public owner intends to utilize a sole-source bid, it will be explicitly identified as such, and the owner will have complied with the requirements of the statute.

The Apparent Low Bid Was Not Responsive

To be considered for an award, a bid must be "responsive". This means the bid must strictly adhere to the material specifications of the



solicitation. See System Development Corp. v. Dept. of Health & Rehabilitative Services, 423 So.2d 433 (Fla. 1st DCA 1982). Florida Statutes, Section 287.012(5) governing state procurements of commodities and services expressly defines a responsive bid as one that conforms in all material respects to the solicitation. For example, if the specifications require the use of a certain type of construction material, say domestic steel, and a bidder proposed to use foreign steel, then the bid would be nonresponsive and subject to being protested.

However, not all deviations from the solicitation will be fatal to a bid. Irregularities in bids are divided into two general categories: (1) material irregularities, and (2) nonmaterial irregularities. Only material deviations render a bid nonresponsive. Whether an irregularity in a bid is material turns on "whether the variation affects the amount of the bid by giving the bidder an advantage or benefit not enjoyed by the other bidders." Harry Pepper & Associates, Inc. v. City of Cape Coral, 352 So.2d 1190, 1193 (Fla. 2d DCA 1978). If the bidder receives or could have received an economic advantage from its departure from the bid instructions, then the variation is material and the bid must be rejected. Minor, nonmaterial irregularities in a bid, i.e. those that do not affect the price, generally may be waived by the owner. In Overstreet Paving Company v. State of Florida, Department of Transportation, 608 So.2d 851 (Fla. 2nd DCA 1992) the apparent low bidder's failure to submit a required form did not provide the bidder with economic advantage. The court held that the failure to submit the form was merely a technical defect because the information on the missing document was also provided elsewhere in the bid.

The Specifications Were Ambiguous

In order for the comparison of price to be fair, all bidders must have based their price on the same specifications. A public owner must provide unambiguous specifications to ensure that the owner can truly compare the prices in order to obtain the best price for the work specified. The owner has to have the ability to perform an "apples to apples" comparison. Wester v. Belote, 103 Fla. 976, 138 So. 721 (1931).

Not every ambiguity in the specifications can serve as the basis for a bid protest. Only ambiguities that are "material" can support a bid protest. Whether an ambiguity is material is determined by whether any bidder was afforded an unfair economic advantage, i.e. was able to submit a lower price than the other bidders. Therefore, although a bid may include unclear or inaccurate specifications, the ambiguity or error must be material to support a bid protest. A challenge will succeed only if the alleged defect is material.

The Owner Awarded the Contract Based on Something Other Than the Criteria Published in the Bid Advertisement

In a competitive bid setting, any contract award must be based on who submitted the best bid based on the criteria set forth in the bid advertisement. A public owner may not award a contract based on some criteria that is not stated in the bid advertisement. In Marriott Corporation v. Metropolitan Dade County, 383 So.2d 662 (Fla. 3rd DCA 1980) the County initially awarded a contract to a bidder on the basis that the bidder was a local business. However, the bid advertisement did not state that one of the criteria to be considered was whether the bidder maintained a local business presence. Accordingly, the court held that the local preference criteria, in that instance, could not be considered in evaluating the bids.

The Owner Allowed the Apparent Low Bidder to Change its Bid.

A public owner also must consistently apply the bid documents to all bidders and may not change or waive specifications after the bids have been opened in a manner that creates the potential for favoritism. In Emerald Correctional Management v. Bay County Board of County Commissioners, 955 So.2d 647 (Fla. 1st DCA 2007) the court held that if a county requested modifications of pricing from one contractor but not another and relied on those modifications in making its award, that would amount to impermissible favoritism.

In Harry Pepper & Associates, Inc. v City of Cape Coral, 352 So.2d 1190 (Fla. 2d DCA 1977), the apparent low bidder based its bid on pumps that were different than what was specified. After the bids were opened, the low bidder said it would provide the specified pumps at the same price used in its bid for the non-compliant pumps. Substitution of the pumps was not allowed. The court held that it would be unfair for a bidder to be allowed to change its bid after the opening. If that were allowed, then the apparent low bidder would have everything to gain and nothing to lose. After everyone else's bids were opened, the apparent low bidder was in a position to decide whether it wanted the job badly enough to incur the additional expense of supplying conforming pumps. None of the other bidders had the option of accepting or rejecting an offered contract.

Conclusion

The examples provided above are just some of the types of flaws that can result in a bid protest. The common element in all bid protests is whether the bid was conducted in a manner that was fair to all qualified bidders and did not restrict competition. Regardless of the facts,



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Florida Utility Contractors visit Lawmakers in Tallahassee

he Underground Utility Contractors of Florida (UUCF) took to the halls of the state capitol in Tallahassee in March to explain to lawmakers the position of utility contractors on a number of issues. "It's all about jobs right now — that was our message," said Bruce Kershner, Executive Vice President of UUCF.

The team fanned out and spoke with legislators about seven priorities including the problem of municipalities self-performing public works projects rather than bidding them out to the marketplace. The law requires local government to bid anything over \$300K, but this is not always happening. Among other things, utility construction representatives also raised their

concern about the raiding of the State Transportation Trust Fund. They also encouraged lawmakers to support a bill that extends the time period for protesting a bid solicitation. Representatives from four of Florida's NUCA chapters participated in the visits to legislators. Representative Will Weatherford, who will be Speaker of the House in 2012, was the guest speaker and joined the group for lunch.

"We also addressed an issue we've been working on with NUCA — AC Pipe bursting. This is a huge issue across the country," said Bruce. Former Congressman and Florida Speaker of the House Tom Feeney gave the group an update on that issue, and because integrated

contractors reached out to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), they are now onboard with us. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection has pledged to help the EPA see that there is no need to dig up pipes once they are burst underground. "What was accomplished with Feeney and others is that we have a good partnership going forward to convince the EPA on this regulation. It's very important for our members to make this trip once a year, and overall, I think the meetings went very well," added Bruce. "Our members were very well received by legislators. The vast majority of what we had on our wish list was very well received, and I have high expectations for the rest of the session."

if you encounter a situation that "isn't fair" or "just smells bad", then it may be worth the effort to dig a little deeper to make sure the letting is being conducted properly.

Registered Contractor License Renewal Reminder

Just a reminder that the Registered Contractor licenses from the Department of Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR) are up for renewal on August 31, 2011. Current law requires licenseholders to obtain 14 hours of continuing education with at least one hour in workplace safety, one hour in workers' compensation, one hour in business practices, one hour in the advance building code module, one hour in laws and rules (Chapter 489) and one hour in wind mitigation (this requirement only affects general, residential, building, roofing and glass and glazing contractors).

Don't forget to notify the DBPR office of any address change. Section 489.124(2) gives sole responsibility to the licensee for notifying DBPR in writing of the licensee's current mailing address and phone number.

Failure to notify the department of a change of address shall constitute a violation of this section. In addition, if your address changes and you do not notify the department, you may not receive important mailings from the department such as your renewal notice.


