

# How An IDEA BECOMES A LAW



### Idea

A citizen, group, or legislator has an idea for a new law. A Representative then decides that the idea should be a bill.



### **House Bill Drafted**

The Representative (also called a member) contacts House Bill Drafting Services and requests a bill to be drafted. The member may provide very detailed instructions or just the general idea. A staff member, called a "bill drafter," will work with the member and his or her staff until the member is satisfied and a final draft is approved. Once approved, the idea receives a bill number (odd numbers only in the House) and is called a bill for the first time.



## JOURNAL

### 1st Reading is by Publication in the House Journal

In accordance with Article III of the Florida Constitution, all bills must be read three times before being voted on. The 1st Reading is by publication of the bill number, its sponsor, and a short one paragraph description of the bill, called a title, in the House Journal. The Speaker will also refer the bill to one or more committees or subcommittees in the House. Committees and subcommittees are groups of members appointed to review specific areas of government such as education, criminal justice, and agriculture, to name a few.



### House Committee or Subcommittee Meeting

Once a bill is referred to a committee or subcommittee, it is reviewed for inclusion on an agenda. The Chair of the committee or subcommittee will decide which bills should be heard. In 2010, of the 843 general bills filed, 488 "died" in a council or committee, never being heard. Once a bill has been heard and voted favorably by all of its committees or subcommittees, it is placed on a House Calendar signifying that it is available for 2nd Reading.





### 2nd Reading on the Floor is by consideration of the Special Order Calendar

Once a bill is on the House Calendar, that does not mean that the bill will be heard on the floor. The House has a special committee called the Rules & Calendar Committee that will determine when and if a bill will be sent to the floor for 2nd Reading. These bills are placed on a recommended Special Order Calendar, Each Special Order Calendar is voted on prior to the House considering those bills on a specific legislative day. Once a bill has been introduced and read on the Special Order Calendar, it is explained, questions are answered about the bill, and amendments are considered. This constitutes a bill's 2nd Reading.





### 3rd Reading on the House Floor by consideration of the Third Reading Calendar

After a bill has been read a second time on the Special Order Calendar, it is taken up on 3rd Reading, generally, on a subsequent legislative day. This is the final reading of the bill prior to being voted on. Once a bill's title has been read a third time, it is explained again, questions are again permitted, and amendments may be offered; at this point, amendments may only be considered by a 2/3 vote. The final action is for debate on the bill prior to the sponsor making a closing statement. The bill is then voted on by the members of the House. Any bill not receiving a favorable vote "dies" on the floor.





### Senate Consideration

Once the bill is passed by the House, it is sent to the Senate with a "message." The Senate's process varies slightly from the House's process. The Senate may vote to pass the bill without amendments and return the bill to the House, refer the bill to a committee for consideration, or defeat the bill on the Senate floor. The Senate may decide to further amend the bill and pass it. If this happens, the bill is returned to the





### Return to the House

If the House has received a House bill having been passed by the Senate without amendments, it puts the bill in its final form called an "enrolled" version. The enrolled version of the bill is then sent to the Governor for consideration. If the Senate has further amended the House bill, it is returned to the House for consideration of the Senate amendments. This "back and forth" consideration of the bill is an attempt to perfect the bill's language by working out the differences, but generally ends after several exchanges by each side. At any time, either the Senate or the House may decide to abandon the effort of reaching a compromise and the bill dies. If the issue is important enough, however, the House and Senate may agree to appoint a conference committee comprised of Representatives and Senators to work out the details of the bill.





### Consideration by the Governor

Generally, if the Legislature is in session and has sent the Governor a bill, he/she has seven days to consider the bill while the Legislature remains in session. If the bill is received after the Legislature has adjourned "sine die" (the 60-day session has ended), the Governor has 15 days to consider the bill. The Governor may take one of three actions: sign the bill into law, allow the bill to become law without his/her signature, or veto the bill. If the Governor vetoes the bill, the Legislature may override his/her veto by a 2/3 vote of the Legislature during the next Session.



At any point of consideration, the bill may "die" for that legislative session, which means it will no longer be considered.

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
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
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### OSHA's Hazard Communication Standard Requires Employers to Educate and Train Employees

OSHA's Hazard Communication Standard ("HCS") requires information to be provided to employees regarding all hazardous chemicals employees may encounter at work. The HCS requires the employer to educate and train its employees when a substance can result in physical hazards (e.g. the substance is explosive or flammable) or health hazards (e.g. the substance may cause skin irritation, eye damage, or cancer.) In OSHA's view most chemicals used in the workplace have some hazard potential and thus will be covered by the rule.

One difference between the HCS rule and many others adopted by OSHA is that the HCS is performance-oriented. In other words, an employer has the flexibility to adapt the rule to the needs of its workplace, rather than having to follow specific rigid requirements. It also means that an employer must exercise more judgment to implement an appropriate and effective program. An example of the more typical OSHA rule would be the spoil pile set back requirement with which we are all familiar (or should be) which mandates that all spoil piles be at least two feet back from the edge of an excavation. There is no discretion allowed in the spoil pile rule. In contrast, under HCS, employers may choose how to educate and train the employees.

The HCS standard is intended to be fairly straight forward. Chemical manufacturers and importers must evaluate the hazards of the chemicals they handle and must provide labels for containers and the all too familiar material safety data sheets (MSDSs) which provide detailed technical information about the substance.

Chemical manufacturers, importers, and distributors of hazardous chemicals are all required to provide the appropriate labels and material safety data sheets along with the chemicals being provided. Suppliers are required to provide a properly completed MSDS at the time of the shipment of the chemicals.

Employers are entitled to rely on the information on the MSDS and have no independent duty to analyze the chemical or evaluate the hazards associated with the chemical.

Interesting, but what is an employer required to do under the HCS?

Employers that "use" hazardous chemicals must have a program to ensure the information is provided to all employees that may use the chemicals. OSHA interprets "use to" mean package, handle, react, or transfer. As usual, OSHA interprets the term very broadly to encompass any situation where a chemical is present and employees may be exposed under normal situations. Thus, if employees can be expected to encounter a chemical as part of their work, they must be informed of the hazards associated with the chemical. An unexpected, or sudden exposure to a previously un-encountered chemical would not require an MSDS. For example, if a pipe crew were to uncover a bottle of Malathion insecticide, failure to provide an MSDS would not be a violation even though Malathion is a hazardous chemical because the crew was not expected to "use" the chemical.

A proper employee hazard communication program must include a written hazard communication program; labels and other forms of warning; material safety data sheets; and employee information and training. And, as always, an employer will be well served by creating an extensive paper trail demonstrating to OSHA that the employee communication and training were done. As with any employee safety rules, an employer must also be able to prove to OSHA that the rules are enforced and violations are dealt with appropriately. Absent proof of enforcement, OSHA frequently deems a written safety program to be ineffective and a "toothless tiger". If you have any questions regarding what constitutes a proper HCS Program or paper trail, give me a call.

There is an exception that may apply to certain work activities contractor employees may encounter. Employees that only handle chemicals in sealed containers, such as in a warehouse are not required to have a written hazard communication program for the sealed chemicals. Basically, employers with employees in that type of work operations need only keep labels on containers as they are received, maintain material safety data sheets that are received and give employees access to the material safety data sheets, and provide information and training for employees. But, because most chemicals in sealed containers that a contractor's warehouse may contain are probably chemicals the employees actually use, it is better to have a written hazard communication program and include all employees in the program rather than hope OSHA will apply the limited exception.

OSHA's Hazard Communication Standard is based on the concept that employees have a need and a right to know the hazards associated with the chemicals they may be exposed to in the work place. OSHA designed the HCS with the goal making sure employers provide employees

with the information they need to know. Employers that do not produce or import chemicals need only focus on those parts of the HCS rule that deal with establishing a workplace program and communicating information to their workers. OSHA has provided a summary of the HCS in a pamphlet entitled Chemical Hazard Communication (OSHA 3084). Like many OSHA rules, the HCS standard is lengthy and at times difficult to apply, but all employers would be well served by reviewing the pamphlet. 



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

The pickup started slowly, but soon the saucer was bouncing along like a crazed kangaroo. Hanging on to the saucer probably would've been a challenge for most folks, but I regularly rode a horse that hated me. Compared to that, this was almost fun.

When the pickup slowed for the first turn, I managed to navigate it with little bloodshed and a
